## CHAPTER 9

### **Climate Migrant's Life Under Threat: *Analyzing Global Efforts Dealing with Climate Change and Climate Migration (SDG 13)***

#### **Introduction**

With millions of people displaced by climate-related disasters and slow-onset occurrences, climate migration is becoming a major global concern. There have been advancements and difficulties in the fight against climate change, especially when looking at SDG Goal 13 (Climate Action). Perhaps the most significant issue of the twenty-first century is climate change. There is now no mechanism in international law to address the massive and unprecedented human displacement that governments around the world will face as temperatures and sea levels rise. Research is being done to change the status that has been assigned to climate refugees, even though the international community does not acknowledge any of them. The absence of a precise definition of climate refugees and international groups' attempts to address and define the problem are two factors contributing to non-recognition.

Climate change refugees are not included by the 1951 Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees, which offers protection to those who have a legitimate fear of persecution because of their race, religion, or other affiliations. Climate refugees are sometimes described as the "forgotten victims of climate change" due to the lack of government data on them. The researcher attempts to examine international initiatives to alleviate climate migrants' vulnerability in this paper.
