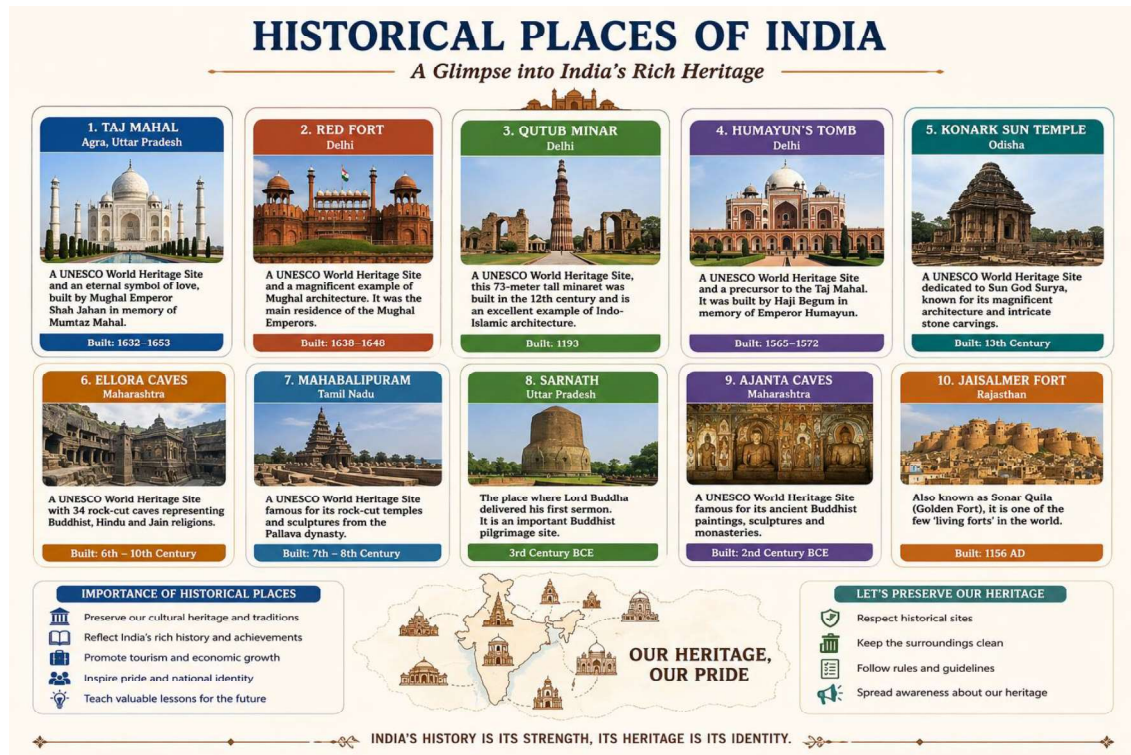


Figure 1. Recognition of Historical Places of India
